Chairs can email Sasha King directly with a copy to Alex Becket simply stating their funding request. As long as the request is for:

Academic/instructional materials and technology to support online and/or on ground classroom instruction with a direct benefit to students 'academic success and cognitive learning in the online or on ground classroom.

Faculty need to provide a brief explanation (two to three sentences) on how their request/s support academic success of students in the online and/or on ground classroom.

Associated Students

Here are a few examples of what A.S. can fund:

- Guest speakers
- Graduation stoles for students
- Funds for food/refreshments for students/student events
- T-shirts or other SMC swag for students
- Payments to vendors for services for students

Criteria

- No salaries or wages to any students or employees of Santa Monica College will be funded.
- No prizes or giveaways with transferrable value.
- The A.S. Board of Directors will not fund proposals retroactively nor reimburse any expenses incurred prior to Board Approval.
- Proposals should be submitted by Wednesdays at 2pm (Weekly, rolling basis).
- Proposals need to be reviewed (and approved) by the A.S. Finance Committee (Wednesdays @ 11am) and the A.S. Board of Directors (Mondays @ 3pm).
- All proposals must abide by the <u>A.S. Fiscal Policy</u>. Please review this for complete criteria and requirements.

<u>Associates</u>

Submissions are generally due in October and in April. You will see a Bulletin asking for submissions. It takes a Professor to back/market the lecture and it has to be geared towards our students and it should Enrich, Inspire & Engage them. Generally, most speakers are paid a stipend of \$250.

Chairs of Excellence

The Chairs of Excellence are grants awarded to exceptional faculty members striving for innovative avenues to advance the opportunities of our students in this global environment with an equity-centric lens at the forefront of their proposal.

The Chairs of Excellence have been established for specific academic disciplines by the generous donations of individuals and corporations. Each chair is established with an endowment of \$100,000 or more, and maintained as separate fund within the permanently restricted portfolio of The Santa Monica College Foundation.

Each applicant is required to submit a proposal for the three-year project. The \$15,000 is awarded over the three-year period at \$5,000 per academic year.

- Only full-time faculty in the Chair's designated discipline may apply.
- Proposals must be approved by their department chair.

The Selection Committee reviews the proposals with the following priorities in mind:

- Professional development of the faculty member can be included as part of the stated goal as long as it pertains directly to a positive impact on student outcomes.
- Proposals must clearly state how the funds will be used to meet the stated goals.
- Selection Committee will meet in April. Decisions will be rendered and formally announced immediately following.

Perkins V – The Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act was signed into law in 2018 with significant changes. The new Act requires that funds be used to develop more fully the academic knowledge and technical and employability skills of secondary education students and postsecondary education students who elect to enroll in Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs and programs of study.

Changes in the Use and Administration of Perkins Funds

- Accountability (Meeting Performance Indicators) projects must focus on Core Indicators for their TOP code and improving student success (attainment of 2.0 or better), completions (degree, certificate or transfer-ready status), employment (placement/retention in jobs), gender-equity,
- **Connections Between Secondary and Postsecondary Education** course sequences from high school through college must be established for each CTE program that receives funds
- Links to Business and Industry A much stronger theme within the 2006 Act is increased coordination with business and industry. Additional focus is also placed on high-demand occupations, in addition to those that are high skill and high wage.
- **Special Populations** A greater emphasis has been placed on special populations by placing the provision of activities to prepare special populations for high-skill, high-wage or high-demand occupations that will lead to self-sufficiency into the required use of funds. We have two name changes and three new populations:

If this indicator is below, please state why: our program is challenged by a greater demand for classes - multiple sections of classes than we can supply. Because of limited facilities, we cannot provide as many sections of classes as necessary to ensure every student can enroll in a film production class. Students often try and fail to get into a class for several semesters, even multiple school years. At some point, they move on, either to another program or to employment. Even when enrollment occurs with a few attempts, a student may need to spend more than two years to complete their degree. Some students feel what they have learned after a period of time is sufficient and seek employment; or decide they don't have the interest in the subject to continue a somewhat indefinite period of time to complete a full degree program. Some students respond to our hands-on orientated classes with the conviction they are ready to find work and have a strong desire to be professionals and they are willing to put the time into finding work as opposed to remaining a student, and trying to enroll in late program classes.
If this indicator is below, please state how you plan to improve it: the college is open to finding a facility for the film production program, so more classes can be added to meet demand. This is likely a long-term solution. Our present efforts are to make the student's education experience as positive as possible, so they will want to remain students long enough to acquire their degree. Providing state-of-the-art and/or the very equipment used in the professional industry is the most effective means of encouraging students to complete all classes in the program and achieve their degree. Faculty strive to provide a class experience engaging enough that finishing the program is considered in the best interest of the students.

If this indicator is below, please state why: he Covid-19 pandemic shut down most film production in 2020 and significantly restricted film production through 2021. While production has returned it has not fully recovered from the pandemic. Regardless, finding employment in the film industry can be daunting. Even with a solid education in the tools and practices of the professional film industry, it takes significant soft skills - confidence in interpersonal communication, to encourage employers to give newly graduated students a chance.

If this indicator is below, please state how you plan to improve it: faculty will integrate more training in on-set conduct, overall professional behavior into classes, connecting knowledge of how to use the tools of the trade with how to behave and work as a team. Faculty will look for opportunities to talk specifically about how to use our training to foster the kind soft skills - focus, attention to detail, communication, initiative, that attracts employers.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE

1. What are the major issues or trends that have been raised by your Industry Advisory Committee over the last several meetings? Ever lighter, high resolution, gimbal-based camera platforms, is a continuing industry trend; and a prime interest to students who want to focus on cinematography. The DJI 4D Cinema 6K camera is the epitome of this kind of technology. Incorporating it into our curriculum will keep us current with state-of-the-art filming tools and encourage our students to participate fully in the program and complete their degrees. The use of LED technology in lighting continues to be an important trend. These lights have many advantages over traditional incandescent sourced illumination. They do not get hot, minimizing personal risk of burns. This make them ideal for introductory to cinematography instruction. They can have variable color temperature controls, reducing the number of lights and lighting implements needed to accomplish a goal. LED lights work very well in Virtual Studio environments and virtual production is itself a trend.

2. How will your Perkins V Project address these issues? We are requesting funds to purchase a stateof-the-art mobile, hight resolution camera platform and LED lights to provide more training in two key areas of advanced filmmaking technology. We have added an advanced cinematography class and the camera system and lights are a way of quantifying why it's the "advanced" class. The lights are also good for introductory classes because there is less risk to inexperienced/first time users.

3. How do your planned activities relate to your program plan or program review? These advanced tools will both allow faculty to get more cinematography training into beginning classes but also enable the faculty to make our the class experience closer to professional work environments, giving students the chance to understand what is expected to be a member of a film crew and make a living at filmmaking.

Local Application Program Information by TOP Code

Briefly describe program improvement issues(s) concerning this TOP code and include specific examples. (Limited to 2,000 characters, or approximately ½ page of text) Our chief improvement issue is how to encourage students to enroll in all the classes in the program and complete the full course of study in film production, earning their degree, being as prepared as possible for either transfer to a university or to seek employment in the professional filmmaking industry. To this end, finding the right balance between an engaging, inspiring



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classroom experience, and the necessary development of good work ethic, through the right degree of challenge, is a focus of our faculty. The best expectation for student involvement is providing them with state-of-the-art technology - filmmaking tools that are exciting to learn and use, and are known to be what professionals use. The advanced camera, lights and other tools should encourage students to engage fully in our program and complete their course of study, achieving their degree, and be fully prepared to find employment in the commercial filmmaking industry.

Briefly describe how the issue(s) will be addressed. What activities will be conducted? Please describe the items in the budget here if not already described elsewhere.

(Limited to 2,000) characters, or approximately ½ page of text.) We have new faculty who are developing the curriculum of the introductory class in film production. More emphasis will be given to camera, lighting, and particularly grip and electric work, since these are prime areas of employment in the industry. Students always respond to hands-on educational experiences and we are emphasizing that character more in the introductory class. Toward this end, we have also added an advanced cinematography class, to give more opportunity for practical train in the popular production area of camera and lighting. Finally, we are changing our advanced film production class to put more emphasis on students demonstrating the skill sets taught in the beginning and intermediate classes. The goal of these changes are to make classes desirable to students, both in terms of learning and developing as artists. All these developments will be aided by the LED lights. Additionally, we are looking to bolster our grip and electric gear with additional silks and other implements. For camera, we are requesting funding for a full-frame zoom lens and professional filter kit. For cinematography classes we are requesting a hazing machine - a traditional but effective lighting tool, still used frequently on professional sets.

construction unless specifically permitted by the authorizing statute or implementing regulations for the program.

The interpretation of the Chancellor's Office is that construction is not an allowable expenditure.

EDGAR Part 74c Section 74.27 refers us to OMB circular A21 which specifies in J.16(B)(1) and (3)

(1) Capital expenditures for general purpose equipment, buildings, and land are **unallowable** as direct charges, except where approved in advance by the sponsoring agency.

(2) Capital expenditures for improvements to land, buildings, or equipment which materially increase their value or useful life are **unallowable** as direct charges, except where approved in advance by the sponsoring agency. Sponsoring agency as used in the OMB circular is the USDE

<u>Supplanting</u>: Supplanting or supporting staff or equipment that should be supplied by the District (maintaining programs rather than improving or expanding them).

The prohibition against facilities and furniture can also be based on the Supplement/Not Supplant provision found in Section 311 of the Perkins Act. Generally construction of a facility is a local responsibility as is the furnishing of the facility with furniture etc. Therefore, to charge such costs to the Perkins grant would be a supplanting of a local responsibility.
