IV. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

• Management Association Update: Mona Martin, President

Updates:

- Southern California Community College District Joint Powers Agency Retiree Health Insurance Fund: SMC has \$1.4 million invested into the Southern California Community College District Joint Powers Agency that has been set aside to cover certain unfunded retiree health benefits. The funds will be kept in the joint powers agreement until a recently formed college task force on unfunded retiree health benefits makes a recommendation on the best way to invest that money.
- Strengthening Career Technical Education Program: Maral Hyeler, Project Manager for Dual Enrollment, reported that the college has received a two-year \$250,000 state grant to establish a dual enrollment program for Santa Monica-Malibu high schools and middle schools in logistics – the international movement of goods and services – which is a fastgrowing field with a high demand for trained workers.
- International Education: Vice President of Enrollment Services Teresita Rodriguez reported that the college is doing a thorough and detailed audit of the International Education Program to improve service to students and to ensure that the program is in compliance with the many detailed and strict regulations set by the federal government. She noted that the two top administrators in the program recently left their posts to take teaching positions at the college and that SMC will soon be launching a nationwide search for a new dean of international education.
- SMC Website: The launch of SMC's new website went smoothly, and it will be monitored closely over the next few months as the transition continues.
- Full-Time Faculty Positions: The Academic Senate prepared a recommendation that ranks the departments' requests for new, full-time, tenure-track faculty positions for the 2008-09 year, and will be forwarding to the Superintendent/President a recommendations for 15 new faculty positions.

FUNDING SOURCE: Auxiliary Department Funds, 2007 Budget

SUMMARY: The Public Contracts Code Section 20652 allows for public education

entities in the State of California to place orders under competitively bid contracts without advertising. There are significant cost savings to the

District by joining in purchasing agreements with other agencies.

The Santa Monica College Police Department requests the purchase of Sun Ridge Systems, a Windows based computerized Dispatch/Records Management software solution that includes mobile computers for the purpose of modernizing the dispatching and records functions of the

communications center.

This system will allow the SMC Campus Police Department to effectively manage data for accurate reporting, minimize the amount of unnecessary man-hours spent performing manual searches for data, and increase communication within the department and the college community to help the District meet its common goal -- "Safety for the College Community."

Additionally this system will:

- Provide future cost saving benefits through: paperless reporting, fewer man-hours to perform searches and data audits, integration of all-in-one solution, easily upgraded and compatible with future technology innovations.
- Support advanced Dispatch/Records Management file setup, storage and query functions as well as Cleary, UCR and other mandated statistical reports.
- Be backwards and forward compatible to ensure data can be transferred from old A.R.M.S. to new system.

- Grow with the expanding needs of our College Community and increasing workload requirements.
- Be easy to learn, use, and maintain in-house.
- Support other programs that are utilized by the police department or may wish to use in the future.
- Include annual, or more frequent, software updates to ensure that the system is functioning at maximum capacity.

REQUESTED ACTION: It is recommended that the Board of Trustees receive Santa Monica

College's Self-Assessment/Response to the California Accountability

Reporting for the Community Colleges, 2007.

SUMMARY: In 2004, Assembly Bill 1417 triggered the creation of a performance

measurement system for the California Community Colleges (CCC). That legislation and ensuing budget action authorized the California Community Colleges System Office (CCCSO) to design and implement a performance measurement system that contained performance indicators for the system and its colleges. As per Legislative intent, the CCCSO collaborated with the system's colleges and advisory structure, a panel of national experts, the Legislative Analyst's Office, the Department of Finance, and the Secretary of Education to formulate this comprehensive system that has become known as "ARCC" (Accountability Reporting for the Community Colleges). In recognizing that this initial report required the CCCSO to test innovative ideas about performance measurement and to use a massive state database, the CCCSO completed the 2007 ARCC report as a pilot report for the

Legislature.

Accountability Reporting in the Community Colleges (ARCC) contains seven measures of student progress and achievement as they relate to the broad mission of the California Community Colleges to support transfer, degree and certificate completion, and basic skills. The measures developed for ARCC reflect a refinement of some of the measures from previous accountability initiatives, such as the Partnership for Excellence (PFE), as well as an expansive consultation process with education scholars and community college practitioners from the field.

ARCC 2007 Report: College Level Indicators Self-Assessment

College Self-Assessment/Response Santa Monica Community College District Santa Monica College

Santa Monica College opened in 1929 with just 153 students and has now grown to a thriving campus with approximately 30,000 students and course offerings in more than 80 fields of study. The college draws its extremely diverse students from throughout Southern California and boasts one of the largest international and out of state student populations in the system. SMC has a strong reputation for transfer of all student populations to the University of California, the California State University, the University of Southern California and other four-year universities.

In Fall 2003 due to a severe budget crisis, course offerings were reduced by 27% (compared to Fall 2002) and this included the discontinuance of several vocational programs. The 2003-2004 annual successful course completion rate for credit vocational programs appears to be an anomaly due to the smaller cohort of students taking vocational courses because of the program discontinuance. The continued downward trend, however, is of concern and the college recognizes the need to more closely monitor these rates as we continue to add new vocational curriculum. Additionally, given the dramatic cuts in course offerings enrollment naturally declined, which more harshly affected students with later enrollment priority. This resulted in a serious decline in the under-18 population during 2003-2004, since high school concurrent students are required to receive the lowest priority. The college profile indicates an increase – a near doubling – in enrollment of students under the age of 18, which can be attributed to college's enrollment recovery efforts and re-growing of high school dual and concurrent enrollment programs.

The basic skills improvement rate declined slightly for the period 2002-2003 to 2004-2005 as a result of the change in demographics produced by the enrollment decline caused by the budget cuts. By the following period 2003-2004 to 2005-2006 not only had the rate stabilized, it improved over the base year. While there was the one year of decline, Santa Monica College's performance level in this area is above the peer group average in this area.

The student progress and achievement rate, percent of students who earned at least 30 units, and improvement rate for ESL have each increased over the past six years. SMC's excellent counseling programs focus efforts on the first-year experience. Programs such as the Welcome Center, the Title V First Year Institute, and the Student Success Seminar assist students through the transition to the college as well as proper educational planning to meet future goals. The steady improvements in these three performance indicators can be directly attributed to the implementation of innovative and effective student service delivery.

Santa Monica College's performance indicators show progressive improvement in most areas over the last three to six years. Although the college's persistence rate in year three is equal to the rate in year one, when compared to its peer institutions it is above average. Santa Monica College is very proud of its long history of academic excellence and student success and embraces every opportunity to evaluate programs and improve performance.

Requested Action: Approval/Ratification

Adopt the 2007-2008 Gann Limit for the Santa Monica Community College District as \$118,596,941 and the 2007-2008 Appropriation Subject to Limitation as \$96,759,934.

Comment:

The Gann Limit figures are based on the prior year limit amended by a State formula. The Appropriation Subject to Limitation is based on the Adopted Budget for 2007-2008.

The Gann limit is a required calculation under Prop 4 of 1979. The idea of the Gann is to limit the growth of government by only allowing expenditures that are tax driven to grow by a certain amount each year (Fund 01.0 only). There are two parts in the calculation: The Appropriations Limit and the Appropriations Subject to Limit. The Appropriations Limit is the maximum amount that the District can budget from tax driven revenue. (Essentially the Gann Limit). This is calculated based on previous years Gann Limit, growth is FTES and an inflation factor determined by the Department of Finance. For 2007-2008 the Appropriations Limit is \$118,596,941.

The second factor, the Appropriations Subject to Limit, is how much the District has budgeted that is from tax driven revenues. This essentially is all of the tax driven revenue (Apportionment, Taxes, etc) less the budget of any mandated programs (DSPS fund 01.0). For 2007-2008 the Appropriations Subject to Limit is \$96,759,934.

As long as the Appropriations Limit is more than the Appropriations Subject to Limit, the District is in compliance. For 2007-2008 there is \$21,837,007 left in the GANN Limit. This "extra" will be transferred to other Districts in the state that are over their limit. The transfer will be handled by the System Office.

Requested Action: Approval/Ratification CREATION OF NEW BANK ACCOUNT – CALIFORNIA STUDENT AID COMMISSION

Approve the creation of a new bank account with Union Bank of California for the purpose of receiving funding from the California Student Aid Commission to be used for Cal Grants. Signers on the account will be Dr. Chui L. Tsang, Randal Lawson and Christopher Bonvenuto.

Comment:

The California Student Aid Commission has recently introduced new regulations that require funds for use as Cal Grants to be kept in an interest bearing bank account. Any interest earned will be reverted back to the State of California. Any fees or charges will be an expenditure of the Fiscal Services budget.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Public Contract Code §4107(a), if the listed subcontractor objects in writing to the substitution, the awarding authority is required to conduct a hearing on the prime contractor's request for substitution.

WHEREAS, the Santa Monica Community College District ("District") received a request from FTR International, Inc., ("FTR"), as prime contractor, to substitute itself in place of Acromedia Construction, Inc., ("ACI"), its listed subcontractor, on the project known as Madison Theatre – Performing Arts Complex ("Project") pursuant to the provisions of Public Contract Code §4107 on the ground that ACI failed or refused to perform its subcontract.

WHEREAS, ACI objected to the requested substitution.

WHEREAS, on October 4, 2007, a hearing was held concerning FTR's request for substitution with Gregory Brown, the District's Director of Facilities Planning, acting as the District's duly appointed Hearing Officer, at which hearing the District received evidence and argument from FTR, ACI and their respective counsel.

WHEREAS, the Hearing Officer, upon consideration of the evidence and argument presented by FTR and ACI, has recommended to the District's Board of Trustees that FTR's request for substitution be granted on the ground that ACI has failed or refused to perform its subcontract.

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED THAT the District's Board of Trustees, in consideration of the evidence and argument presented by FTR and ACI and the recommendation of the District's Hearing Officer, hereby consents to FTR's request that itself be substituted in place of ACI for the Project on the ground that ACI has failed or refused to perform its subcontract.

SUMMARY:

An ad hoc subcommittee of the Board of Trustees was formed to review and make recommendations on Board of Trustees procedures and functions. Recommendations on the role of the Chair of the Board of Trustees were discussed and revised as follows by the Board.

- The Board Chair will develop with the Vice-Chair and President an annual master calendar of upcoming and anticipated agenda items and policy decisions. Major policy decisions may require a first reading, second reading, and and/or study sessions to allow ample time for discussion and processes that respect shared governance. Examples of major policy decisions that require ample time for discussion include setting goals, developing and adopting the annual budget, and the future direction of the college.
- The Chair will conduct meetings and make rulings to keep order.
- The Chair will discourage personal attacks from speakers (see Board Policy 1570.
- The Committee recommends that newly appointed Chairs and Vice-Chairs receive training on chairship such as that offered by CCCT and ACCT.
- The Chair may present and the Board will review and adopt rules of order for conducting Board meetings
- The Chair and Vice-Chair will work with the President to ensure that agenda presentations and reports are timely and sufficient for a deliberative decision-making process.
- The Chair and Vice-Chair will develop a list of local organizations and identify trustees who can serve as liaisons/links/goodwill ambassadors to these groups.
- The Board Secretary will notify the chair when there is an award of special recognition; the Chair may then compose and authorize a note of recognition from the Board.

- The Chair and Vice-Chair will look for opportunities to award proclamations to recognize outstanding contributions to SMC.
- Review Board policies relevant to the functioning of the Board and amend or comply.

BOARD POLICY 1260

Duties of the Chair of the Board of Trustees

It shall be the duty of the Chair to preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, to enforce parliamentary rules, and to appoint all special committees for which no provision has been made in other District policies. He/she shall sign all papers and documents as required by law or as authorized by action of the Board of Trustees. He/she shall be authorized to call special meetings of the Board of Trustees and it shall be his/her duty to do so upon the written request of a majority of the members.

The Board Chair shall determine the seating of the Board of Trustees at the annual organizational meeting by choosing either drawing of numbers or alphabetical assignments of seating for trustees other than the Board Chair seated in the middle, the Vice-Chair seated to the left of the Chair, the Superintendent seated to the right of the Chair and the Student Trustee seated in the designated Student Trustee position. This new seating will take effect at the next meeting of the Board of Trustees.

It shall be the duty of the Chair to review the agenda for meetings of the Board of Trustees. The agenda will be prepared in advance by the Superintendent/President and reviewed at a regularly scheduled agenda meeting.

Measure U Projects:

- Three new facilities were opened this fall:
 - (K) Earthquake Replacement Liberal Arts South Building (Humanities and Social Sciences Building) with 15 classrooms and labs, and 30 faculty offices.
 - (J) Music Complex at Madison. Renovation of the existing building for the Music Department with 27 practice rooms and a rehearsal hall/black box called "second space."
 - (L) Shuttle Replacement Lot: The former Verizon lot at Stewart and Exposition was purchased in January 2007 and was resurfaced for use as a college shuttle lot.

Pending Projects:

(M) North Quad Plaza: The construction bids on this project were too high (over \$4 million higher than expected). Some adjustments were made and the project went back out to bid. The project is scheduled to start in December, 2007 and be completed in December, 2008.

Measure S Projects

- Two projects in planning:
 - (I-A) Athletic Fields Phase I, John Adams: Planning is completed and the project is in DSA for approval. Construction will start in summer, 2008.
 - (I) Corsair Field: With the increasing costs associated with this project, the District decided to go forward with a very simple upgrade to the field by changing to artificial turf, resurfacing the track and upgrading/improving the lighting.
 - (2) Performing Arts Complex (Madison): Construction is progressing will be completed sometime in early spring 2008.
 - There is not enough Measure S funding to complete all the projects listed, so the District will be prioritizing the projects. Additional funding from other sources will continue to be pursued.
 - In response to a request to continue parking as a priority, it was reported that the
 District launched a major transportation initiative with the Big Blue Bus to reduce the
 number of cars coming to campus. In addition, students are being encouraged to park at
 off-campus sites by offering free parking.

Measure U Expenditures

- It was noted that \$6,167.070 has been received from Santa Monica Redevelopment Funds for the (K) Earthquake Liberal Arts South (K). The District will apply for \$3 million of FEMA funds for the Earthquake Replacement Liberal Arts North Building.
- There have been no bond issues or redemptions since the last meeting.
- It was requested that a quarterly report showing expenditures by project be prepared for the next meeting.
