Management Association Update/Classified Staff Recognition Award: The SMC Management

• Updates:

Olympic Shuttle Lot: The Board will be awarding the contract to begin construction on the replacement parking shuttle lot at the corner of Stewart Street and Exposition Boulevard. Last year, the college purchased the 2.35-acre site from Verizon for a 210-space shuttle lot that will replace a lot the college had used for many years at Santa Monica Airport. The lot should be completed by the beginning of the fall 2007 semester.

Property at Pico Boulevard and 14th Street: The District has been in discussions with officials of the YWCA of Santa Monica for a possible collaborative use of the collegeowned property at the southeast corner of 14th Street and Pico Boulevard. The hope is to bring to the Board a collaborative agreement with the YWCA.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4

SUBJECT: 2007-2008 SABBATICALS

SUBMITTED BY: Chair, Board of Trustees

REQUESTED ACTION: It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve eight one-semester

sabbaticals for full-time faculty for 2007-2008 as follows:

Mary Colavito, Spring 2008 (Life Sciences), will complete an online course for instruction in using bioinformatics resources and explore bioinformatics databases and search tools used for gene identification and comparison. The knowledge gained will enrich the material presented in biology courses and enable Professor Colavito to design guided search strategies so students can investigate the realm of bioinformatics.

Roman Ferede, Spring 2008 (Physical Science), will conduct chemical research on extraction and analysis of carotenoids in fruits and vegetables at the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture, and write a handbook on this work to be used by SMC chemistry students. Additionally, Professor Ferede will begin work on a grant proposal to increase instrumentation in organic and biochemistry laboratories at SMC.

<u>Kathy Flynn</u>, Spring 2008 (Outreach/Counseling), will travel to Guatemala, El Salvador, Belize, and Mexico in order to obtain information from those countries on basic skills standards in primary and secondary schools, as well as information on their testing processes for placing students in post-secondary schools. She also will obtain information on campus resources available to low achieving and second language students. This will enable SMC to better counsel and place the large number of SMC students from Latin America and evaluate their previous education.

Josh Kanin, Fall 2007 (Communication), will complete the research for and write the first draft of a book that will contribute to intellectual film literature. In focusing on the 50-year Hollywood careers of the husband-wife writing teams Fay/Michael Kanin and Garson Kanin/Ruth Gordon, the study will explore the central role of screenwriters in the filmmaking process and their relationship to other key film professionals. The book will provide instructors and students in Film Studies with an informative and supplemental textbook for classes in American film history and cultural studies.

<u>Makoto Nishikawa</u>, Fall 2007 (Modern Languages), will take graduate courses and seminars at University of Shizuoka in Japan in theoretical linguistics. Professor Nishikawa will use the sabbatical to increase his knowledge of Japanese linguistics and language pedagogy, create a database of digital slides that incorporate Japanese characters, gather cultural artifacts to be used in the class, and gain insights into contemporary issues in Japanese culture and society.

<u>Eileen Rabach</u>, Spring 2008 (Social Sciences and Philosophy), will do independent research leading to the publication of a reader that will supplement the 2008 (second edition) of *Macroeconomics*, a textbook by Paul Krugman. The reader will fill a "policy debate gap" characterizing introductory economic textbooks. This reader will provide students with a slate of controversial case studies to analyze utilizing introductory macroeconomic theory, and stimulate student discussion and debate over issues that profoundly impact them.

Walter Sakai, Fall 2007 (Life Sciences), will travel to Costa Rica to band birds and continue work on the ageing and sexing of resident tropical birds, as well as the neotropical migrants. He also will analyze data from bird banding stations he operates in California with the goal of publishing his findings. This work will hone Professor Sakai's bird banding skills, and enable him to pass this knowledge on to students who work with him these projects and take biology courses.

Edith Spain, Spring 2008 (Education/ECE), will immerse herself in the Reggio Approach to early childhood education by working as an intern within the Marine Park/17th St. Growing Place and the First Pres. Preschool on Second Street. Through documentation panels, videos, photos, PowerPoint, etc., Professor Spain will use her knowledge to enhance SMC's Early Childhood Education curriculum and potentially to supplement pedagogical approaches used by faculty in other SMC departments, as well.

<u>COMMENT:</u> The Joint Academic Senate Sabbaticals/Fellowships Committee is

recommending that the Board of Trustees approve the sabbaticals listed above. The collective bargaining contract with the Faculty Association requires the District to fund the equivalent of eight semesters of sabbaticals

each academic year.

SUBJECT: NOTICE OF SMCCD INITIAL BARGAINING PROPOSAL TO SMC FACULTY ASSOCIATION AND PUBLIC HEARING

SUBMITTED BY: Superintendent/President

REQUESTED ACTION: Pursuant to Section 3547(a) of the Government Code, Board Policy 3134

and Article 18 of the collective bargaining agreement between the Santa Monica Community College District and the Santa Monica College Faculty Association, the District hereby presents its proposal for a successor collective bargaining agreement with the Faculty Association. The public shall have an opportunity to comment on this proposal before negotiations

commence.

Article I: Agreement

Term of Agreement.

Proposal: The District proposes a 3-year term ending on August 20, 2010, with limited re-openers during each year of the term.

Article 6: Faculty Assignment and Load

Article 6.1 – Duties of Assignment.

Proposal: The District proposes that the description of unit members' duties be updated to reflect more accurately the community college environment.

Article 6.5.4 and Appendix L – Employment Contracts.

Proposal: The District proposes that the contracts for hourly employment in Appendix L be revised to clarify the parties' respective rights and obligations.

Article 6.7 – Assignment – General Provisions

Proposal: The District proposes updating the language regarding the times for assignments of tenured and probationary faculty.

Article 6.18 - Reassigned Time and Intersession Task Assignments

Proposal: The District proposes that the language regarding the number of LHE available for reassigned time each semester be clarified.

Article 7: Evaluation

Articles 7.2 and 7.9/Appendix O.

Proposal: The District proposes updating the evaluation procedure and forms for part-time faculty.

Article 8: Salary

Article 8.1 - Salary Schedules.

Proposal: The District proposes a salary increase for the period from August 21, 2007 through August 20, 2008 that reflects the District's needs to increase full time student equivalents and to curtail expenditures and that reflects the principle of total compensation.

Article 10: Fringe Benefits

Title.

Proposal: The District proposes changing the title of this Article to "Health and Welfare Benefits."

Article 12: Grievance Procedure

Article 12.3.8

Proposal: The District proposes bifurcating the arbitration procedure where there are questions regarding the arbitrability of a grievance.

Article 19: Reduced Workload

Article 19.1.8.

Proposal: The District proposes clarifying the language of this Article to comply with STRS requirements.

Article 21: Banking of Assigned Load

Article 21.3.

Proposal: The District proposes reducing the cumulative balance in a faculty member's bank.

The District reserves the right to add additional items to its initial proposal.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6

SUBJECT: RECEIPT OF PERSONNEL COMMISSION PROPOSED

2007-2008 BUDGET

SUBMITTED BY: Superintendent/President

REQUESTED ACTION: It is recommended that the Board of Trustees acknowledge receipt of the

2007-2008 proposed budget for the Santa Monica Community College District Personnel Commission. The Personnel Commission Budget will be

discussed as part of the District's regular budget process.

SUMMARY: The total budgeted amount is increased over last year's budget in the

amount of \$9,400 for personnel operation related software. This amount will provide the ability to track recruitments more accurately, perform calculations related to the testing process and provide reports. This is the only increase in the entire budget. All other increases have been

accommodated by corresponding decreases in other line items.

The salary for the Director has been increased to accommodate the hiring of the new Director of Classified Personnel, but total salaries remain at the

same amount budgeted for last year.

The consultant and legal budgets remain at the same figures used in last year's budget although some accommodations by making account transfers within the Personnel Commission budget had to be made this fiscal year to accommodate increased consultant fees and increased legal and advertising fees. These increased charges for this fiscal year are not anticipated during the 2007-08 year because a new Director has been hired instead of using consultant services to pay charges for an acting director and an executive search firm. Advertising costs will be less because the department has placed more emphasis on internet advertising, targeting other colleges and universities, the Chancellor's website and local newspapers. We do not anticipate using the Los Angeles Times classified services.

The amount of \$15,000 included in the consulting budget should provide the funding to continue the services of the Hay Group in the implementation of the reclassification and compensation study.

Other changes are minor and include reducing off campus printing by \$500 and including that amount in meals and catering for raters. Previously these funds came from petty cash and it seemed more accurate to reflect this amount in the budget. The practice is to provide a continental breakfast and/or lunch to raters who serve the college without fees.

<u>COMMENT</u>: The proposed budget will be presented for formal action at the next regular

session meeting of the Personnel Commission in May. An invitation will be sent to the Board and District administration, and the leadership of CSEA to

attend and present their views.

The sidewalk and traffic signal equipment will be sited on the existing easement on the District property. This action extends the easement two feet to the west in order to provide the City of Los Angeles with the required right-of-way width for the road designation (a total of 12 feet). California Education Code Sections 81310 through 81315, Dedication of Real Property, authorizes the District to dedicate an easement to another public agency without consideration for public street or highway purposes. requires that Board of Trustees, by a two-thirds vote, adopt a resolution of intention to include a time not less than 10 days after adoption for a public hearing by the Board of Trustees. Pursuant to this Memorandum of Understanding, the

parties hereto agree as follows:

PURPOSES AND SERVICES TO BE RENDERED:

The SMCCD and the SMMUSD have jointly agreed to provide the following services:

- I. The establishment of a Pre-K-14 Collaborative to ensure curricular articulation in English Language Arts and Mathematics and future collaboration in other disciplines.
- 2. The offering of college curriculum and courses at both the college and high school campuses based on identified individual school site needs in both core and elective programs;
- 3. The provision of summer program for high school students through concurrent and dual enrollment;
- 4. Shared use of facilities that benefits both district in terms of classroom and athletic spaces;
- 5. The collaboration and articulation of career and technical educational programs between the school district and the college district;
- 6. Develop a High School Transfer Academy to provide high school juniors and seniors the opportunity to participate in the collegiate curriculum to meet graduation and transfer requirements.
- 7. Implement the Early College High School Program for SMMUSD students from grades 9-12.

MOU DATES:

The following dates have been agreed upon and are subject to change only by prior or mutual agreement between both parties:

- School year and summer concurrent enrollment Summer 2007 and ongoing
- 2. Career and Technical Educational Programs current and ongoing

EXPENSES AND/OR

COST TO THE DISTRICT:

There are no extraordinary expenses that the SMMUSD or the SMCCD assumes under this Memorandum of Understanding. Both the School District and the College District shall work collaboratively to seek grant funding to support the Collaborative.

WHEREAS, California Community Colleges serve 2.4 million students annually through a system of 72 locally-established and governed community college districts with 109 colleges within a statewide system;

WHEREAS, California Community Colleges need stable funding, predictable student fees, local control, and the ability to provide effective leadership for the system of 109 colleges;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative (officially known as the Community College Governance, Funding Stabilization, and Student Fee Reduction Act) would ratify the bilaterally-governed community college system by placing it in the State Constitution, thereby securing local governance while enhancing state leadership;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative would provide the local community colleges with a secure, stable source of funds that is tied to community college enrollment growth, and thus stop the annual competition between K-12 and community college districts for Proposition 98 funding without harming K-12 schools;

WHEREAS, the use of the actual community college enrollment growth figure would avoid the artificial funding cap that would otherwise be imposed on community colleges over the next ten years because of declining K-12 enrollment;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative has qualified for the February 5, 2008 statewide election;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative will provide the Santa Monica Community College District with \$54 million in additional funds over the next five years;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative would not threaten funding for K-12 education in California because primary and secondary education would retain a separate funding mechanism tied to its growth;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative would end the "zero-sum" game of the Proposition 98 split, which has resulted in shifting funds from community colleges to K-I2 schools under the current provisions of Proposition 98;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative would ensure that promises made by the Legislature are kept with a property tax guarantee;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative funds the increase to community colleges over the next ten years through natural growth in the state's general fund, without raising taxes;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative reduces student fees to \$15 to make them stable and predictable as well as consistent with personal income, and prohibits the Legislature from increasing fees in the future by more than the change in per capita personal income;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative would eliminate the possibility of mid-semester fee increases and guarantee that students will have at least 60 days' notice before any fee increase takes effect:

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative ensures that fee revenue stays with the community colleges for the improvement of education, instead of being diverted to other state programs;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative would allow the Board of Governors and Chancellor to hire the senior staff professionals currently appointed by the governor, and thus have the same authority as that provided to the UC President and CSU Chancellor;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative includes provisions in the state constitution for locally-elected governing boards accountable to voters and for a statewide chancellor hired by a board appointed by the governor;

WHEREAS, the California Community College Initiative allows locally-elected governing boards to overturn unreasonable and costly state regulations by a two-thirds vote; and

THEREFORE, be it resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the Santa Monica Community College District supports the Community College Governance, Funding Stability, and Student Fee Reduction Act.

Measure U Projects:

- (J) Music Department at Madison, (K) the Liberal Arts Replacement South (HSS History and Social Sciences) Building, and the (L) Shuttle Replacement Lot are currently in construction and will be completed by summer., 2007.
- (M) North quad: This project is at the DSA (Department of State Architect) for approval. It is probably a one-year project.
- (O)The Student Services Building has been approved by the State for 50 percent funding; the other 50 percent will come from Measure U funds. The District is in the process of selecting the architect. The project will be a couple of years in planning and approvals before construction begins. All student services will be housed in this building and will be on the footprint of the Music Department, Concert Hall and Amphitheater.
- (P) Science Complex Addition: There are no more Measure U Funds, but the State has encouraged the District to apply for funding for this project.
- (T)14th and Pico Project: This project is currently on hold. The District was directed by the Board of Trustees to work with the YWCA about a joint project on the property.

Measure S Projects

- (#1) Corsair Field: This project is being looked at in conjunction with the (#4) Replacement Health, Fitness, PE, together with the potential for underground parking. The costs are incredibly high and beyond budget, so the District is in the very preliminary stages of trying to come up with an affordable project to serve the needs of the campus, the physical education department and the community.
- (#I-A) Athletic Fields Phase I, John Adams: Planning is completed and the project is in DSA for approval.. Construction will probably start in summer, 2008.
- (#2) Performing Arts Complex (Madison): Construction is progressing on this very complex building. The original bid was \$30 million, but the length of construction and the complexity of the building have increased costs. When completed, it will be a spectacular building able to handle any type of major performance.
- (#3) Career Opportunity Center: In February, 2007, the Board of Trustees approved the Bundy Campus Master Plan, which includes the replacement of the existing two-story building with a structure that will house the Career Opportunity Center. As part of the Master Plan, a traffic signal will be installed at Bundy and the District has agreed to create a new driveway on the north side of the property.

Bond Issue

The District issued a \$12 million bond for Measure U. The District also refinanced Measure S which will in the long run save the taxpayers \$10 million and generate an additional \$8 million for construction.

The District received \$4 million from the City of Santa Monica Redevelopment funds for the Liberal Arts Earthquake Replacement project. Other funding for this project will come from FEMA and Measure U.
