

Starter Classes

➤ GLOBAL 5 | International Political Economy: Introduction to Global Studies
This course offers an interdisciplinary introduction to the fields of Global Studies and
International Political Economy. Students will analyze critically the role of national
governments, international organizations, nongovernmental organizations, and multinational
corporations, in regard to phenomena such as, international markets and production
regimes, monetary and trade policy, international and global conflict, and environmental
degradation. Contending theoretical and ideological perspectives regarding international
systems, processes, and trends will be applied and evaluated.



Starter Classes (continued)

➤ GLOBAL 11 | World Geography: Introduction to Global Studies

This course introduces Global Studies through a survey of the world's major geographic regions. Students will encounter core concepts related to processes of global connection and change, while also developing basic geographic literacy in the distribution of human and natural features on Earth. Students will examine and discuss significant issues—cultural, social, political-economic, and environmental—impacting humanity today as both problem and possibility. In particular, this course considers the diverse localized impacts of globalization as a continuing story of peoples and places isolated and connected by imperial, colonial, and international systems of the past and present.

Global Studies 11 is the same as Geography 11. Students may earn credit for one but not both.

University Research Opportunities

Intro-level social science research and PhD preparation program; 25 community college students in social science related majors are accepted each year; Preference is given to students who are underrepresented within academia (e.g. underrepresented racial/ethnic minorities, former foster youth, formerly incarcerated, veteran, students with a disability, nontraditional age students, etc.); Program runs from November to May, with the opportunity to participate in a summer undergraduate research program.

Scholars receive support through a small research grant, meet and interact with their CC2PhD Graduate Student Mentor and CC2PhD Community College Faculty Advisor, and attend Saturday Academies at UCLA as well as monthly discussion sessions with a CC2PhD Transfer Student Peer Advisor.

Starter Classes

SOCIOL 1 | Introduction to Sociology

This course introduces the study of society and human social interaction. Both macro and micro sociological theory are discussed, as well as methods of sociological inquiry, cultural development, the process of socialization, social structure, social stratification—particularly in the areas of social class, race and ethnicity, and gender—and social change. Students are highly encouraged to complete Sociology 1 prior to enrolling in other sociology courses.

Students may earn credit for either Sociology 1 or Sociology 1S but not both. Only Sociology 1S fulfills the Santa Monica College Global Citizenship Requirement.



Starter Classes

SOCIOL 1S | Introduction to Sociology - Service Learning

By relying heavily on the instructional method of service learning, this course introduces the study of society and human social interaction. Both macro and micro sociological theory are discussed, as well as methods of sociological inquiry, cultural development, the process of socialization, social structure, social stratification—particularly in the areas of social class, race and ethnicity, and gender—and social change. Students are highly encouraged to complete Sociology 1 or 1s prior to enrolling in other sociology courses. This course requires students to engage in learning outside the classroom in conjunction with various community-based organizations. Check with the Sociology program (http://smc.edu/sociology) to see when this course is offered.

Students may earn credit for either Sociology 1 or 1S but not both. Only Sociology 1S fulfills the Santa Monica College Global Citizenship Requirement.

- ▶ WGS 10 | Introduction to Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies Introduction to the study of women and men in society, covering comparative issues of social, political, and economic position in the workplace, family, cultural institutions; historical basis of gender based subordination; the female experience; the male experience; relations between women and men; intersections of ethnicity/race, class, sexuality and gender; violence against women; cultural images of women and men; social roles of women and men, LGBTQ identities and movements for social change
- WGS 40 | Introduction to LGBTQ Studies
 This introductory course examines a broad range of contemporary and historical gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersex and queer issues in various contexts, such as social, scientific and cultural contexts.
