Who We Are: Walter Coronel Profile of an Emeritus Student by Ada Hollie



Walter Coronel volunteers as chairman of the critically important Emeritus College Fundraising Committee. He and the committee work tirelessly to raise money for important projects. Walter has been chairman of the Fundraising Committee since 2010 and his goals of increasing the amount raised

and the percentage of students who donate each year has been achieved with the exception of 2015 when the percentage of students donating dipped slightly. His warmth and friendliness are assets he brings, continuously, to this endeavor.

Walter was born in Amsterdam, Holland. Because his family was Jewish, his parents went into hiding during WWII when the Nazis invaded. A local farmer hired Walter and his brother to work on his farm. The farmer, who was very religious, never asked about their religion. Walter and his brother attended the Catholic church with the farmer's family and they worked on the farm until the war ended. After the war, Walter and his brother were reunited with their family and, in 1947, the family moved to the U.S. Walter attended Hollywood High School and so he felt lucky that he had already studied English while in school in Holland. After graduating, he went on to attend Los Angeles City College and California State University, Northridge.

Walter was drafted in 1952 to fight for the U.S. Army in the Korean War even though he had not yet become a citizen. He became a U.S. citizen in 1954.

The education Walter received from college, combined with the skills he developed in the Army, allowed him to obtain a job as a technician for... (Cont'd on Page 2)

In the Fall 2015 term, Emeritus launched a process for students to evaluate their instructors, which is consistent with SMC's college-wide practices. Some of you may have already filled out the evaluation forms for your Emeritus faculty, while others may not see them for a while. The reason for this variance is that student evaluations will only be distributed in classes where the faculty are going through a peer evaluation that term.

In order to help you better understand this new process at Emeritus, we have created some helpful questions and answers below.

What is the purpose of the evaluation forms that students fill out?

The purpose of the evaluation forms is to provide feedback to faculty to help them continuously improve their courses and, ultimately, your educational experiences.

Why are there 2 evaluation forms?

The Instructor Evaluation Form is the small green and white form where you bubble in your answers on the front side only. Student responses are then sent to the Information Technology department for scanning and processing. A summary report of the student responses is shared with the faculty member, evaluator and appropriate academic

administrators (it is only placed in the faculty member's personnel file if requested by the faculty member). The Instructor Evaluation Comment Form is the larger form where you can... (cont'd on Page 3)

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Schmoozing With Shirl: A Determined Man by Shirl Grayson

Holocaust survivor, successful entrepreneur, inventor, Oscar winner and lecturer summarize the life story of Emeritus student, Dr. Adolf A. Perlmutter. Born in Vienna, Austria, Perlmutter spent his childhood in Vienna and the Netherlands.

When Hitler came to power in 1939, his parents sent him to the Netherlands for safety. In 1940 the Nazis occupied the Netherlands and Jews were sent to Amsterdam and Austria. Twice the Nazis captured the young Perlmutter and twice he escaped being sent to Auschwitz death camp by jumping off the transports and residing with non-Jewish families. He eventually joined the British army as an interpreter. In 1945 he traveled to Palestine to join his mother, but she died two weeks before he arrived. He went on to join the Jewish underground.

Perlmutter took an entrance exam to continue his education in London and then attended Princeton University where he met theoretical physicist, Albert Einstein.

He received his masters at Princeton and his doctorate at the University of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Perlmutter started a successful company, Byna Sciences, and invented a stabilized movie camera that won him an Oscar in 1969. In time, he sold his company and moved from Philadelphia to Los Angeles. He retired at age 88. Dr. Adolf A. Perlmutter is the author of the book "Determined", the story of his life.

A Stitch in Time in Popular Class by Betty Herman

Sweaters, afghans and friendship. All are a big part of the Emeritus Needlecraft class taught by Susan Ryza. The casual atmosphere encourages students to share ideas and knowledge as they work on projects of all kinds.

At a recent class, students described an "amazing class" where they are able to share fellowship as well as stitches. Personal enhancement, social interaction, cultural diversity, and a wonderful feeling of togetherness were some of the other things mentioned as enjoyed in the class. They talked about how much they learn from Ryza's amazing skills and knowledge in a wide range of needlework and said, "It's like having a private tutor."



One student joined the class to learn how to read a pattern. Another makes things in order to do things – try out patterns, try new stitches - and enjoys the social group. Some were working on sweaters. One learned to crochet there. Another was making small circles and squares to eventually put together into "something."

Over the years the group, as individuals, has donated lap blankets to convalescent homes, hats and blankets for premature babies, and yarn to women in shelters so they could do their own projects.

Ryza started teaching the Needlecraft class in 2004. She has an extensive background in her field, including a stint in the Peace Corps working with weavers in El Salvador. She envisions the class as a place for learning and honing needlecraft skills, and also a place for sharing ideas and socializing.

A Valuable Resource for Seniors by Helen Wachs

The Ken Edwards Center at 1527 Fourth Street in Santa Monica houses WISE and Healthy Aging. Originally two independent organizations, WISE Senior Services and Center for Healthy Aging merged in 2007 to become WISE and Healthy Aging and pursue their mission of "enhancing the independence, dignity and quality of life of

older adults through leadership, advocacy and innovative services." Club 1527, also at the Center, offers classes, lectures, concerts, health screenings, and travel opportunities throughout the United States and around the world.

This article outlines just some services offered by the organization. We hope that you will remember them when you or someone you know faces an issue that the center can address.

- The Benefits Enrollment Center helps older adults apply for critical public services.
- The WISE Diner/Senior Lunch Program offers nutritious lunches and time for socializing at three sites.
- The Adult Day Care Center cares for frail, memory impaired older adults.
- There is information about transportation alternatives.
- Care Management is available for homebound older adults to connect to services and resources.
- Mental Health and Peer Counseling services are offered through a team approach.
- There are caregiver and bereavement support groups.
- WISE and Healthy Aging partners with organizations to provide financial information and legal guidance.
- For adults who live in long term care facilities, WISE and Healthy Aging operates the LA City and County Ombudsman Program, the largest of its kind in the nation. Its professional staff and sixty-seven volunteers visit facilities and investigate concerns and complaints of elder abuse and neglect.

The larger Instructor Evaluation Comment Form includes questions on what you liked best about the learning experience, if you have any suggestions for improvement and any additional comments you may have.
